- The company expanded its operational solar capacity by 6.60 MW through a capital investment of Rs. 14.04 Crores. This initiative successfully scaled the aggregate solar power capacity to 19.874 MW, enabling renewable energy to account for approximately 32% of total energy consumption during the fiscal year.
- To further mitigate GHG emissions, the company is executing a subsequent expansion phase to increase solar capacity by an additional 4.219 MW. Backed by an investment of Rs. 9.24 Crores and is scheduled for completion in June-2026. This project will elevate the total rooftop solar plant capacity to 24.093 MW, significantly yielding long-term utility cost savings and lowering grid-dependence.
- Following the completion of pipeline project the company plans to deploy an additional 3.00 MW of solar capacity with projected capital expenditure of 7.50 Cr. Bringing the ultimate cumulative solar infrastructure target to 27.093 MW.

As part of its commitment to sustainable water management and resource conservation, the entity actively monitors, treats, and recycles its liquid waste streams. The enterprise continuously implements robust technological solutions to mitigate environmental impacts and maximize water circularity across its manufacturing units. The detailed breakdown of the implemented and ongoing Zero Liquid Discharge (ZLD) mechanisms across various production facilities is structured below:

a) Mandideep Production Facility (Madhya Pradesh)

Mechanism Implemented: Yes.

- **Capacity:** 600 KLD Zero Liquid Discharge system.

- **Process Details:** Effluent undergoes treatment in a Sewage Treatment Plant (STP). The treated effluent is then directed into a two-stage filtration network consisting of an **Ultra Filtration (UF) system followed by Reverse Osmosis (RO)**.
- **Utilization:** The final recovered water is fully reused internally within the facility's humidification plant.

b) Lalru Village Unit (Distt. S.A.S. Nagar)

- **Mechanism Implemented:** In Progress.
- **Process Details:** The facility is implementing a system to utilize approximately 350 KLD of STP treated water in its spinning unit Humidification Plant
- **Execution Status:** A commercial order has already been placed with M/s. ION Exchange India Ltd. to complete this setup. The plant is scheduled to be commissioned in FY 2026-27.

c) Dhandari Kalan Facility (Distt. Ludhiana)

- **Mechanism Implemented:** In Progress (Under execution).
- **Capacity:** 1200 KLD Zero Liquid Discharge Plant.
- **Capital Investment:** 15 Crores.
- **Execution Status:** The procurement order for the ZLD plant has been placed, and civil work is completed and erection of machinery is actively under progress.
- **Timeline:** The plant is scheduled to be commissioned in FY 2026-27.

d) Additional Sewage Treatment Infrastructure

- **Total Infrastructure:** 6 active sewage treatment plants (STPs) located across the entity's spinning units.
- **Combined Capacity:** 2,175 K.L. per day.

The Company demonstrates a strong commitment to environmental sustainability and carbon footprint reduction through strategic capital investments. These initiatives focus primarily on accelerating renewable energy adoption, optimizing machinery efficiency, and implementing advanced water conservation systems across its operational units.

A. Renewable Energy Infrastructure & Solar Expansion

The company has systematically transitioned its spinning units toward sustainable power sources by implementing extensive Roof Top Solar Plants across multiple locations at village Lalru and Lehli, Distt SAS Nagar, Village Jitwal Kalan, Distt Malerkotla, Village Jodhan, Distt. Ludhiana and Village Simrai, Mandideep, Distt. Raisen (M.P.).

- **FY 2025-26 Expansions:** The company expanded its operational solar capacity by **6.60 MW** through a capital investment of Rs. **14.04 Crores**. This initiative successfully scaled the aggregate solar power capacity to **19.874 MW**, enabling renewable energy to account for **approximately 32% of total energy consumption** during the fiscal year.
- **Pipeline Infrastructure Projects:** To further mitigate GHG emissions, the company is executing a subsequent expansion phase to increase solar capacity by an additional **4.219 MW**. Backed by an investment of **Rs. 9.24 Crores** and is scheduled for completion in June-2026. This project will elevate the total rooftop solar plant capacity to **24.093 MW**, significantly yielding long-term utility cost savings and lowering grid-dependence.

- **Subsequent Phase expansion:** Following the completion of pipeline project the company plans to deploy an additional **3.00 MW** of solar capacity with projected capital expenditure of **7.50 Cr.** Bringing the ultimate cumulative solar infrastructure target to **27.093 MW.**

B. Technological Upgrades and Energy Efficiency

To curb indirect emissions stemming from high energy consumption, the entity is actively modernizing its production facilities.

- **Machinery Replacement:** The company has allocated **Rs. 325 Crores** toward upgrading its spinning units with ultra-modern, energy-efficient machinery. We have initiated modernization of existing spinning units which involves replacing old machines in the department of Ring Frame, Cards, Speed Frames, draw frames and combers, winding outlay of Rs.325Crores out of which Rs.250 Crores has already been utilized so far. We have also invested for modernization of humidification plant in our spinning units.
- **Impact:** This systemic replacement directly optimizes power consumption ratios, lowers thermal output, and minimizes operational energy waste.

C. Sustainable Resource Management & Waste Recovery

In addition to direct energy management, the company integrates circular economy principles to minimize its wider environmental footprint.

- **Effluent Treatment:** The company has already started taking initiative to convert its STP /ETP's into Zero Liquid Discharge Plants. Total one STP is already converted into ZLD plant and its water is being used in Humidification plant. Conversion of One STP and One ETP Plant into ZLD is under progress and will be converted to ZLD within FY 2026-27.
- **Resource Recovery:** By utilizing sophisticated recovery systems, the facility maximizes water recycling, mitigates local water depletion, and reduces the environmental overhead associated with resource processing.
